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

t seems fitting that Riddle's newest surgical technology was named after Leonardo da Vinci, since it heralds a renaissance of possibilities for the surgeons who operate here. This spring, Riddle introduced the da Vinci $X^{\text{\tiny M}}$ Surgical System, a robotic-assisted platform for minimally invasive procedures across a variety of specialties—and the first in the Delaware Valley.

"I see the da Vinci as a new tool in the surgeon's kit, to help them get the best results. It's like a painter getting a new brush that provides different strokes," said Sumedh Kakade, MD, general and colorectal surgery, Riddle Hospital.

The da Vinci enables a surgeon to perform complex and delicate procedures through very small incisions, with greater precision than what is achievable using conventional laparoscopic tools. Though robotically assisted, the surgeon maintains complete control at all times.

This impacts both patients and physicians in the community, because it's really a rebirth of minimally invasive surgery at Riddle Hospital," said Patrick Ross, MD, PhD, Main Line Health System Chair, Department of Surgery.

"With the da Vinci, patients experience less pain in recovery, allowing us to send some home without narcotics, which is important given the opioid crisis in our country," said Joseph Gobern, MD, FACOG, Main Line Health System Chair, Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Dr. Ross, one of the leading robotic thoracic surgeons in the U.S., and Dr. Gobern, a minimally invasive and robotic-assisted gynecologic surgeon, were both involved in bringing robotic capabilities to Riddle Hospital.

The da Vinci also offers several advantages over conventional laparoscopic surgery. Surgeons have a magnified, 3D, high definition view inside the

patient's body for improved visualization. Wristed instruments bend and rotate far more than the human hand, providing unmatched dexterity for performing delicate tasks in small spaces.

"With colorectal surgery, robotic technology adds a level of finesse that allows us to operate in a small space with more precision and elegance," said Dr. Kakade.

Robotic technology is also beneficial in gynecologic surgeries. "Complex conditions like endometriosis and severe pelvic pain can affect other areas like the bowel or bladder, or extend near major vessels. The da Vinci's 3D visualization and wristed instruments allow us to see anatomy very well and get into spaces that may require special attention to avoid the risk of injury to other vital organs," said Dr. Gobern.

NEW OPTIONS FOR MORE PATIENTS

"I am excited to offer patients advanced laparoscopic procedures here at Riddle, and feel it brings us to the forefront in medicine. It improves the surgical treatment of endometriosis, allowing for the resection of more lesions, which decreases pain and increases the quality of life for my patients," said Kathrine Lupo, MD, a Riddle gynecologist who has performed robotic procedures at other MLH hospitals.

Patients at Riddle who were not candidates for traditional laparoscopic surgery may now have the minimally invasive option of robotic surgery, including those with complex disease or patients who are morbidly obese.

CLOSE TO HOME

"Everyone at Riddle, including administrators, physicians and operating room staff, is very excited to be able to offer such advanced surgery to improve the care of our patients," said William Ayers, MD, general surgeon, Riddle Hospital.

By offering robotic technology, Riddle will attract more skilled physicians to our campus and further enhance our surgical program. More importantly, surgeons from Riddle who previously performed robotic procedures at other campuses can now offer them here in our community.

"For patients who specifically asked about undergoing robotic surgery, but were hesitant to have their operation away from Riddle, we can now offer the latest technologically-advanced surgical techniques and medical care close to home," said Arjun Khosla, MD, urologist, Riddle Hospital.



49-year-old male was brought by his sister to Dr. Adam Weinstein, a neurologist at The Center for Neuroscience, because her brother's memory and behavior had become alarmingly strange.

Dr. Weinstein looked for possible causes of cognitive impairment. The patient's MRI was analyzed by neuroradiologists Dr. Neerav Mehta and Dr. Garen Boghosian, who determined that the patient had intracranial hypotension, or "sagging brain syndrome."

The patient's brain, instead of floating in cerebral spinal fluid, was lying on the floor of his skull-a condition caused by a leak in the dura, the sac surrounding the brain and spinal cord. For the patient to recover, the leak had to first be found and repaired—a challenge that ultimately involved multiple medical centers around the country, and began at Riddle.

It was Dr. Weinstein's methodical approach that pulled the first thread to start unraveling this medical mystery.

It is safe to assume that most of Dr. Weinstein's patients will not have their cases written about in The New York Times Magazine.

Dr. Weinstein diagnoses and treats patients with a range of symptoms-from headache, confusion and behavioral changes, to numbness, pain and weakness in the body—for a variety of disorders of the brain and nervous system.

The case that was profiled last fall was notable for its rarity; however, the steps Dr. Weinstein took to diagnose his patient, ultimately leading to a successful treatment, were par for the course for this dedicated physician.

"In addition to conducting a thorough exam and medical history, it is important for neurologists to listen carefully to patients and take their stories seriously," said Dr. Weinstein.

"Our team takes a thoughtful approach when facing a complicated problem. We offer neurologic testing such as EEG (electroencephalography) to record brain waves, EMG (electromyography) to check neuromuscular function, and memory testing. We collaborate with radiologists to obtain CT and MRI scans of the brain and spine, and we consult with physical therapists to assess balance, swallowing, and other functions that may be affected by neurologic disorders," he said.

Dr. Weinstein sees patients in Riddle Hospital's Emergency Department and inpatient units, and at the outpatient Center for Neuroscience at Health Center 2, along with two other neurologists, two neuropsychologists and two critical psychologists.

Riddle Hospital also has a strong stroke program, and as part of Main Line Health, has rapid access to the Neurovascular Center at Bryn Mawr Hospital, should a patient need more advanced care.

"Our physicians have the training and experience to diagnose and treat most neurologic disorders right here at Riddle. We also take a highly personalized approach, so our patients can trust that if the best option for a rare or complex case can be found elsewhere, we will facilitate a referral to ensure timely, appropriate care," said Dr. Weinstein.

The BiliBed® Phototherapy System exposes an infant's skin to ultraviolet light so that jaundice, a common condition in newborns, can be effectively treated, and babies can go home as quickly as possible.

Since the model of care in The Birthplace is designed to promote bonding, BiliBeds support this standard by allowing caregivers to keep the baby in the mother's room while providing the therapy. The Scholler Foundation has provided ongoing significant funding to Main Line Health system hospitals since 1980.

Healing treatments for mind and body

A HOLISTIC APPROACH TO **HEALTH AND RECOVERY**

t Riddle Hospital, our goal is to make every patient as relaxed and comfortable as possible while receiving medical care. Aside from the physical aspects of illness, injury or surgery, some patients may experience stress related to pain and recovery, while others may have feelings of anxiety or depression.

Patricia Vassell, DNP, MBA, RN, CNOR, Director of Nursing Surgical Services and The Birthplace at Riddle, explains, "Health care is changing, and we pay attention. More patients than ever are promoting health from within and are using some form of integrative therapy already, whether it's meditation, massage, deep breathing, yoga and more. We are pleased to offer our patients, free of charge-holistic treatments that are proven to aide in recovery and reduce symptoms such as pain, anxiety, fatigue and depression."

Integrative therapies currently offered at Riddle Hospital include:

- Reiki—Healing energy work that helps reduce pain, anxiety and improves overall sense of well-being. It is a relaxation and stress reduction technique that is a complement to traditional medicine to provide the best possible healing and recovery for our patients.
- Aromatherapy—The use of essential oils can be a soothing complement to medical care. Our trained nurses incorporate lavender (calming, muscle relaxation, sleep) and peppermint (revitalizing, decreases nausea) essential oils into their daily routines.
- Pet Visitation—Service dogs Finn, led by owner and Riddle employee Cathy Robbins and Lucy, led by owner and volunteer Pat Riviello, help decrease stress and lift spirits with their calming companionship and therapeutic presence while visiting patients who meet the required criteria for this therapy.

Vassell adds: "Nurses, doctors, patients and families can request these services to aid in the healing process of patients. As part of our 'well ahead' approach to health care, to date we have trained more than 80 nurses in providing aromatherapy and 12 nurses in Reiki with the sole goal of enriching our patients' experience and recovery process."

FOCUS ON REIKI



"Across the board, patients have a depreciable decrease in pain, an improvement of mood, and increased relaxation and calmness."

Reiki (/'reiki'/) is a ancient Japanese technique developed for stress reduction and relaxation that also promotes healing from within. Riddle's Reiki program evolved from successful pilot studies at both Riddle and Bryn Mawr Hospitals. Riddle's study was designed to assess the effectiveness of reiki in managing pain for orthopaedic patients who had undergone hip, knee or spine surgeries. A team of trained nurses measured pain on the 0-10 pain scale with postsurgical patients, showing "statistically significant reductions in pain" when reiki was used. On average, pain levels decreased by 3.01 points and overall anxiety decreased by 4.07 points. Demand for the service has increased tremendously.

With 12 registered nurses now certified in Reiki at Riddle, the team treats more than 80 patients every month with priority given to surgical patients. Each 30-minute session is provided by a trained registered nurse. "Our biggest referrers are the doctors and nurses," Vassell explains. "There's a really accepting culture around reiki at all of the Main Line Health hospitals."

An Epic transition, a pivotal transformation

t 6:45 am on Saturday, March 3, 2018, after two years of planning and preparation, Main Line Health transitioned from our previous electronic health records systems to the Epic system, making possible a pivotal transformation that will enhance every area of our health care system.

Epic is a key part of our PIVOT initiative (Promoting Innovation by Valuing Organizational Transformation), enabling us to build a new technological infrastructure that will seamlessly integrate inpatient and ambulatory care with clinical and financial systems, and fully support value-based care and population health.

With the full support of the Main Line Health Board of Governors, the transition to Epic followed—and met—a timetable established in 2016. The launch did much more than simply move hundreds of thousands of our patient records—it integrated multiple clinical and administrative computer systems to support high quality care:

- Our physicians and practitioners have real-time access to a single computer system that holds all patient records across all of our locations and specialties, speeding access to treatment and improving patient care. Clinicians also gain secure communication, mobile charting, and clinical practice guidelines that will improve efficiency and increase safety and quality.
- Patients can now access their own records and securely communicate with their health care team—two factors proven to lead to improved patient outcomes. Through the online My Main Line Health Chart, patients can—from any device—schedule primary care appointments, request prescription refills, view lab and test results, coordinate family care, pay bills, and much more.

 Patients also have a single, integrated record throughout Main Line Health and will receive one consolidated bill covering services received at all our entities and Main Line HealthCare physicians.

Driven by a goal of providing a safe, timely, efficient, effective, equitable and patient-centered experience for everyone, everywhere, every time, teams of clinicians and specialists from key administrative areas worked over the past two years to improve clinical and financial workflows so that, no matter what office or campus a patient visits, the experience is the same, whether scheduling an appointment, undergoing a procedure, or being discharged home.

In the months preceding the Epic launch, nearly 9,000 clinical and administrative staff were trained in the new system to make the transition as smooth as possible. With such a massive undertaking, some changeover challenges were anticipated. To resolve issues and minimize impact on patients and providers, hundreds of At The Elbow (ATE) staff clad in green shirts were positioned round-the-clock throughout the health system, as well as at satellite launch centers.

As the opportunities available through Epic are realized throughout Main Line Health, more PIVOTal transformations will be implemented, enhancing our commitment to patient safety, continuity of care, and real-time reporting and analytics.
